GENERAL ORDER NO. 13-12-1

ORDER TO ADOPT SCHEDULE OF
COLLATERAL FORFEITURE

Pursuant to Fed. R. Crim. P. 58(d)(1) and LMR 2(c), this Schedule of Collateral Forfeiture allows a defendant to pay a fixed-sum payment in lieu of appearance and end the case for non-mandatory citations. If a defendant chooses not to pay the fixed-sum payment and appears to contest the citation or violation notice, the fixed-sum amount in this Schedule of Collateral Forfeiture is no longer applicable. After appearing, a defendant faces the maximum penalty allowed by law. However, nothing prevents a magistrate or district court judge from issuing any sentence it deems appropriate under the law. This Schedule of Collateral Forfeiture only applies to defendants charged by citation or violation notice.
